MANAGERS' COMMENTARY

In May, Italian luxury jacket manufacturer Moncler performed strongly post the completion of its acquisition of the Stone Island brand. French luxury group Kering also performed well following a strong first quarter. Adidas, the German sportswear firm was another positive after it raised its sales growth outlook.

On the other side, Masimo underperformed despite strong earnings results, which the market had expected to be higher. Ansys was negative during the month due to a small revenue disappointment after releasing its Q1 2021 results. Alibaba also underperformed with investors concerned about the potential for company earnings to be impacted due to higher investment costs.

During the month we purchased Farfetch, the US online luxury clothing platform. This gives the portfolio exposure to the growing online luxury channel and we project a strong sales growth for the business, driven by an ongoing increase in market share. We funded the purchase by exiting the position in Starbucks, which has had a strong run and was sold close to our price target. We also bought US tech firm Autodesk, it is well positioned to capture the ongoing growth in the construction sector that we foresee in the years to come, with a potential upside scenario linked to a stronger impetus from the infrastructure spending programmes targeted by various governments. Also, during the month we exited cybersecurity firm CyberArk due to reduced

conviction in the growth potential of the business.

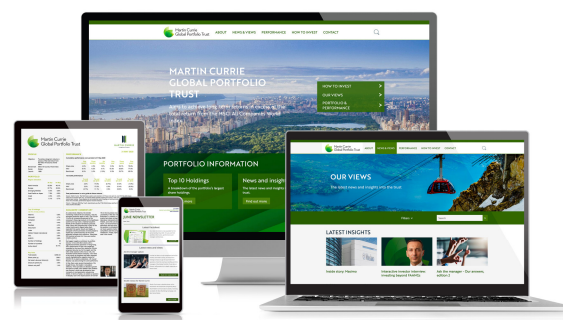
Zehrid Osmani

Morningstar Rating for Funds

Morningstar rates funds from one to five stars based on how well they've performed (after adjusting for risk) in comparison to similar funds. Within each Morningstar Category, the top 10% of funds receive five stars, the next 22.5% four stars, the middle 35% three stars, the next 22.5% two stars, and the bottom 10% receive one star. Funds are rated for up to three time periods—three-, five-, and 10 years—and these ratings are combined to produce an overall rating. Funds with less than three years of history are not rated. Ratings are objective, based entirely on a mathematical evaluation of past performance. They're a useful tool for identifying funds worthy of further research, but shouldn't be considered buy or sell recommendations.

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
