MANAGER'S COMMENTARY

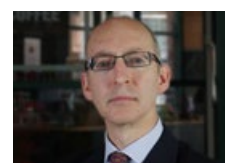
Asian equities were down in September, with the MSCI AC Asia ex Japan index falling 1.7% in sterling terms. India was the weakest market over the month, followed by the Philippines. Thailand was the best-performing market, followed by Singapore. By sector, stocks in the consumer discretionary sector lagged the most, while energy fared the best. The company's NAV fell 2.1% over the month.

The top three detractors were consumer discretionary stocks. At an absolute level, Indian company Maruti Suzuki detracted after its share price fell significantly in September. In the absence of any company-specific news, we suspect the share-price weakness had more to do with country allocation flows. The underlying demand picture for passenger vehicles in India remains very strong and we are confident that Maruti's product offering will ensure it remains the dominant original equipment manufacturer (OEM) in India. Hero MotoCorp also detracted on concerns about a competitor's discounting strategy and potential for a price war. Lastly, Malaysian consumer company Genting Berhad had a negative impact after it delivered lacklustre second-quarter results at the end of August.

On the other side, Hong Kong-based life insurer AIA made a notable contribution to

performance. Second-quarter data from the Hong Kong Insurance Authority demonstrated that policy growth had recovered following a disruption earlier in the year due to restrictions on insurance policies with a significant investment element. Monthly premium data released subsequently lent further support to a belief that premiums have returned to growth. Elsewhere, the market reacted positively to the announcement that Singapore Technologies Engineering (STE) has agreed to acquire a 100% stake in MRAS Systems General Electric for US\$630 million. China Mobile also contributed to performance. With subscriber net adds of 25.8 million, it has already exceeded its full-year target of 25 million. It also continues to gain the majority of industry broadband subscriptions, with 75% market share in August.

In terms of portfolio activity, we made no complete purchase or sales.

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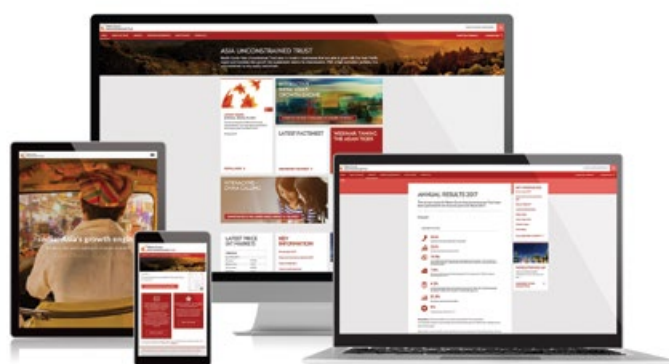
